The meeting began with the Pledge to the Flag.

REGULAR MEETING: 7:08 P.M.

BOARD MISCELLANEOUS AND LIAISON REPORTS

Mayor Brown thanked everyone who was involved with opening up the ice skating at the Tarrytown Lakes. The Fire Department, Recreation Department and the snow watch crew all did a fantastic job. It was enjoyed by many people, and brought back some great memories.

Trustee Kim reported on a meeting that he attended along with NYS Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart Cousins and the NYSDOT regarding the Route 9 transportation study. The DOT will be putting together the proposed costs for the possible phase one. One item that was mentioned was the repaving of Route 9 in Tarrytown. In places like Benedict, the light is cycling much faster as well as the pedestrian call button. The DOT did note that as they go along and do work such as paving or any sort of work, they will incorporate small safety improvements as well. The Village will remain in contact with the DOT, and let them know some things that we feel that are safety issues. Hopefully the DOT will take them into account. Mayor Brown commended Trustee Kim and the entire committee for securing a meeting with a NYS Senator and the DOT. She is aware that it is not an easy task, and appreciates the effort of everyone involved.

Deputy Mayor McGovern reported that there were 165 residents that obtained skating buttons and an additional 28 guests obtained buttons as well for skating on the Tarrytown Lakes. The skating button costs \$5.00 for residents and it is good for the whole season. The fee for guests is \$10.00. When the ice is thick enough, the skating hours are weekdays 1:00 pm to 7:30 pm and weekends the hours are 10:00 am to 7:30 pm. You may check the Village website for updates. Deputy Mayor McGovern thanked Anthony Ross from the Parks Department who is responsible for determining if the ice is thick enough to skate on. Trustee Rinaldi commented that if you haven't had the opportunity to skate on the lakes you should go out and try it. It's beautiful and magical. Deputy Mayor McGovern stated that she would look into a possible skate swap as currently renting skates is not an option.

Trustee Rinaldi reported that if people would like to order a free COVID test the website went live today. The website name is covidtests.gov. It's extremely simple and easy to do. While we do not know what the delivery timeline is, he encourages people to order the free test kits. Trustee Rinaldi also reported that the Placemaking Committee met today, and is looking at ways to take small spaces in the Village and beautify them. One idea is doing some murals or street art. So far a few places have been identified including Kaldenberg on the side of Taste of China. The Placemaking Committee will be presenting a design, plan and a GoFundMe initiative in the near future. There are a few other places

that have been identified as well, and he thinks it will be an incredible addition to the Village.

CHANGES AND/OR ADDITIONS TO THE AGENDA

There is a request to go into Executive Session at the end of the meeting as there are advice of council questions that need to be discussed as a follow up from Wednesday's Work Session.

ADMINISTRATORS REPORT

Administrator Slingerland reported that the Village is already starting to look at next year's budget, although it does not have to be introduced for another two months. We are definitely going to comply with the 2% tax cap this year, and we do have remaining carryover from prior years. As always, we want to keep the tax load on our local residents and business as limited and under control as possible. Administrator Slingerland received a phone call today from Scenic Hudson and they advised him that Governor Hochul announced that they included \$3.5 million in the state's budget for funding the SEQRA review for the Cross Metro North Walkway.

PRESENTATION: TEAC ANNUAL REPORT BY CO-CHAIRS RACHEL TIEGER AND DEAN GALLEA

Mayor Brown introduced Rachel Tieger and Dean Gallea from the Tarrytown Environmental Advisory Council.

Mr. Gallea explained that TEAC is a volunteer, resident lead council with nine voting members appointed by the Board of Trustees. They have been in "business" since 1974 and were organized under New York State Law. TEAC advises the Mayor and Board of Trustees and other Village Boards and Committees on environmental matters as they arise. They also work closely with the Village Administrator, Trustee Kim and other Village staff as needed. They have a broad role across a number of Village agencies and public education responsibilities, as well as stewardship projects.

<u>PUBLIC HEARING: AMENDMENT TO CHAPTER 157 FILMING, SECTION 157-8</u> <u>REGARDING PENALTIES FOR OFFENSES</u>

Deputy Mayor McGovern motioned to open the Public Hearing, seconded by Trustee Hoyt.

WHEREAS, the current penalty for production entities that do not secure a film permit in advance is much less than the actual fee and has not been a sufficient deterrent, and;

WHEREAS, a public hearing notice was published in the Journal News on January 6, 2022; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing on the proposed action was held on January 18, 2022; and

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees of the Village of Tarrytown is the only agency which has approval authority over the Proposed Action, and is therefore Lead Agency for the Proposed Action.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Village of Tarrytown Board of Trustees does hereby determine that the Proposed Action is a Type II action and therefore no further action or review is required under NY SEQRA; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the Village of Tarrytown does hereby adopt Local Law Number 1 of 2022 to amend the Code of the Village of Tarrytown, Chapter 157, Section 157-8 to increase the Filming Violation Fine / Penalty to double the required Film Permit Fee.





